

ISABELLA COUNTY WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM No.1 (LAKE ISABELLA)

BOIL YOUR WATER BEFORE USING

A loss of pressure for an **Emergency Repair** and shut down to a portion of the Isabella County Water Supply System No. 1 (Lake Isabella) system serving the area of:

The Residents living **North of Cordoba Lane and West of the Barcelona Drive, including the Cul-de-Sac on the North end of Barcelona Drive, and including 1024 Barcelona Dr., in Forest No.2 Subdivision in the Village of Lake Isabella, MI** will have the water temporarily shut off on Monday, December 4, 2017 due to a water line leak near 1003 Barcelona Drive.

Bacterial contamination may have occurred in the water system.

Bacteria are common throughout our environment and are not generally harmful. However, when a water system loses pressure for any significant length of time, precautionary measures are recommended.

DO NOT DRINK OR SERVE THE WATER WITHOUT BOILING IT FIRST. Bring all water to a boil, let it boil for five minutes, and let it cool before using. Boiling kills bacteria and other organisms in the water. Boiled or bottled water should be used for drinking, making ice, coffee, pop or other beverages, and preparing food until further notice.

The Isabella County Water Supply System is working to restore pressure. Water staff will take remedial actions such as flushing and collecting bacteriological samples from the system to determine when the water system meets the state drinking water standards. It's estimated the problem will be resolved within seventy-two hours (Friday, Dec. 8, 2017).

The boil water notice remains in effect until results from the sampling verify the water is safe to drink. **Another notice will be issued when the boil water advisory has been lifted. The boil water lift notice will be posted on the Isabella County Website www.isabellacounty.org**
